

## **Conference Proposal Selection Criteria**

Criteria	1 - Poor	2 – Doesn't Meet Standard	3 – Meets Standard	4 – Exceeds Standard
Title	The title gives <b>little or</b> <b>obscure information</b> about the session's proposed content.	The title <b>vaguely matches</b> the session's proposed content.	The title <b>describes</b> the session's proposed content and what the attendees will <b>learn or do</b> .	The title <b>succinctly describes</b> the session's proposed content and <b>captures the</b> <b>audience's</b> attention.
Content	The proposal either <b>does not</b> <b>include session objectives</b> ; <i>and/or</i> the objectives are <b>inappropriate</b> for the conference/audience; <i>and/or</i> they <b>lack focus</b> on a particular area or topic.	The proposal's objectives are <b>undefined or vague</b> , and may <b>not be relevant</b> to the conference/audience.	The proposal's <b>objectives</b> and relevance are implied.	The proposal's objectives are <b>clear and very relevant</b> to the conference/audience.
Relevance	The proposal's content or underlying premise relies on <b>dated or discredited</b> <b>practice or theory</b> , <i>and/or</i> <b>no target audience</b> is identified; <i>and/or</i> the proposal is <b>irrelevant</b> to the conference.	The proposed session recycles established theories/practice; and/or the topic is too general or vague.	The proposed session is relevant to current practice/ research, and the topic and audience is clearly identified.	The proposed session content <b>extends current</b> <b>theory or practice</b> , pushing the field <b>forward</b> .
Clarity	The proposal's language is unclear and may include language errors, or be disorganized.	The proposal is <b>general</b> , and does not include session outcomes.	The proposal is <b>clear</b> and includes a general statement of <b>session outcomes</b> .	The proposal is <b>clear and</b> <b>well-written</b> , including an explicit statement of premise, session outline, and session outcomes.
